Doyle Administration Awards \$95,000 to Moraine Park Technical College ***Builds on Governor's Initiative to Make Child Care Tax Deductible***

Fond du Lac – Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development (DWD) Secretary Roberta Gassman announced today that DWD is awarding \$95,972 in Community Child Care Initiative grants to Moraine Park Technical College as part of Governor Jim Doyle's *KidsFirst* Initiative.

"The quality of care and learning opportunities that our kids receive at an early age is directly related to their development and ability to do well in school," Secretary Gassman said while announcing the grant. "This investment in our children and families through stronger child care programs will last a lifetime."

Moraine Park Technical College offers comprehensive training opportunities in the child care occupations area where students can receive an Early Childhood Associate Degree or a Child Care Services Technical Diploma. Approximately 275 students attend child care classes each year, many of whom will become child care providers.

Moraine Park Technical College will use these funds to increase child care provider and child welfare collaboration, to enhance family resource areas in child care centers and to offer child care to parents who are attending Basic Education and English as a Second Language classes.

In 2006, DWD will award a total of \$2.5 million statewide in Community Child Care Initiative grants to counties, tribes, municipalities, public school districts, and Wisconsin Technical College districts. The grants will be used to improve the quality, supply and accessibility of child care throughout Wisconsin. Recipients must match the grant funds which may be towards a variety of activities to improve child care quality, such as:

- Helping parents make informed choices about selecting child care;
- Educating the general public;
- Increasing opportunities for children with disabilities in child care settings;
- Local collaborative planning to improve early child care and education services;
- Develop a community plan for meeting child care needs related to four-year-old kindergarten for working families; or
- Offering child care for children documented to be receiving or in need of protective services.

"We are committed to the children and families in our state – from promoting and improving early childhood education, to giving our parents a tax break on paying for child care," said Secretary Gassman.

Governor Doyle has proposed a new tax deduction that will allow parents to deduct up to \$3,000 for child care expenses for one child, and up to \$6,000 for two or more children. This new tax benefit will save nearly \$400 for a family with two children in child care. According to the National Association of Child Care Research and Referrals Agency, there are 253,335 children in Wisconsin under the age of six that have either both parents working or are from a single parent household where the parent works.
