Subject: **Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Policy Update 05-01 -- 2005 Federal Poverty Levels**

Purpose

This transmits the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' (DHHS) Federal Poverty Level Guidelines for use in establishing youth program eligibility and local income-related policies. These policies include those related to determining "priority of service," defining self-sufficiency, and providing need-based payments under the WIA.

(Note: The Lower Living Standard Income Level is also used in WIA for eligibility and income-related policy purposes; it is released by the U.S. Department of Labor on an annual basis, typically in late May.)

Background

For WIA programs, the federal poverty level must be considered in determining eligibility for youth services and for determining "priority of service" for adults and dislocated workers to receive intensive and training services. The federal poverty level is also considered in development of local policies related to eligibility for need-based payments for dislocated workers and may be a factor in local definition of "self-sufficiency" for service to employed workers and other local policies that incorporate income related guidance.

Each year, the U.S. DHHS issues new poverty guidelines that federal programs must use if the programs include income-related requirements based on the federal poverty level. U.S. DHHS poverty guidelines for 2005 were released in the Federal Register on February 18, 2005. (See <http://aspe.hhs.gov/poverty/05poverty.shtml>)

Policy

Effective with this WIA policy update, the federal poverty guidelines for 2005 as published in the Federal Register on February 18, 2005, and printed in this WIA Policy Update are to be used as the basis for youth eligibility determination and other local policy guidance based on federal poverty levels.
