Notes:

1. Employment is rounded to the nearest ten. Numbers may not add due to rounding.
2. Employment is a count of jobs rather than people, and includes all part- and full-time nonfarm jobs. Employment does not include jobs among self-employed, unpaid family, or railroad workers.
3. An estimate of non-covered employment is included in NAICS 8131(Religious Organizations), but not in any other industries.
4. Government includes tribal owned operations, which are part of Local Government employment.

Information is derived using 2006 CES (3/06 benchmark) and 2006 QCEW. Unpublished data from the US Bureau of Labor Statistics and the US Census Bureau is also used.

To the extent possible, the projections take into account anticipated changes in Wisconsin's economy during 2007 and 2008. It is important to note that unanticipated events may affect the accuracy of the projections.
