Wondering if early childhood education is right for you?

If you love kids and are energized by spending time with them, working in an early education program might be a good fit for you. **Consider these questions**:

How does childcare provide steady, in-demand work?

Early childhood education fills an important need for many families, and offers individuals steady employment. In fact, more than half of Wisconsin childcare providers have unfilled spots on their staff.*

How can you help children develop?

This career lets you play an important role in shaping children's physical, mental, social, and emotional development.

Is there a job where no two days are the same?

Working with kids offers the challenge of using your knowledge and emotional intelligence to provide child-specific support and teaching.

How can you grow your career with the support of a team?

If you are a people-person, you may enjoy the team effort of early childhood education as well the opportunity to step into a leadership role.

How can you experience and learn from each kid's and family's differences?

Part of the appeal of childcare is being able to see individual children and families as unique, with their own strengths, challenges, and approaches to learning.

What can you do to help kids learn?

If you're curious about how child development and the learning process can be nurtured, an early learning setting can be a fascinating daily experience.

Early childhood education: Career paths and growth opportunities

Just like any career path, there are a variety of ways for early childhood education workers to advance in responsibilities and pay. Here's an initial look at roles and future possibilities.

Just getting started, and wondering what to do next?

Where to begin

The first step into early childhood education is as an assistant teacher or teacher. In Wisconsin, the requirements can vary depending on the school or program you are interested in. Start at the <u>Wisconsin Registry</u> website to learn more about the different credentials available. You can also check out the <u>Job Center of Wisconsin</u> for training opportunities specific to your childcare career goals.

Evaluate your path forward

There are a few different ways to step into a childcare career. One way to build skills and experience at the same time is through apprenticeships. Visit the <u>Wisconsin Apprenticeship page</u> through the Department of Workforce Development to learn about <u>Youth Apprenticeship or Registered Apprenticeship</u> programs in early childhood education, including reimbursement opportunities for both you and the childcare provider you would work with.

While some organizations and programs require a bachelor's degree in education, many allow a state-approved <u>teacher preparation program</u> such as a technical diploma. At the least, look for programs that offer Introduction to the Childcare Profession, Fundamentals of Family Childcare or Principles of Childcare Certification as a starting point.


Evaluate your education path

Curious about owning your own childcare business?

Owning your own group childcare center, family childcare business, or day camp lets you combine a career you enjoy with a small business owner's control over schedule and workload. There are many details involved in owning your own business, but there are also resources to help you get started, as small childcare businesses are important to Wisconsin's economy.

While the education path can be less traditional for business owners than for teachers or administrators, you will still want to have similar coursework to senior-level teachers so that you're prepared to create curriculum and be aware of developmental needs and opportunities.

Want to strengthen or expand your current childcare business?

Running a childcare business is equal parts rewarding and challenging. If you already have your business up and running, there are resources and programs in place to help early childhood education providers grow and thrive.

Where to start

Consider opportunities for <u>strengthening your business</u>, such as hiring employees to increase capacity or evaluating whether a business loan for remodeling or relocating would allow your business to take a more ambitious path.

Evaluate your path forward

As you consider growing your business, different knowledge and skills beyond education could help you achieve your goals. Explore business and administration classes within early childhood education <u>degree programs</u> at a school near you.

As your childcare business expands, you'll need employees to increase capacity. The <u>Job Center of Wisconsin</u> offers a way to post job openings and review the resumes of qualified job-seekers.

Build opportunity out of areas of need

The high demand for childcare means that there are opportunities ahead for savvy businesspeople. One possibility is to evaluate local needs: For instance, if you are in a neighborhood that has many school-aged children, could you add an after-school program to your service offerings? If a local business has a second shift, would it be possible to partner with them to offer evening or overnight resources? See more areas of possible childcare needs.
